Boston BullPen Project is a non-profit organization that partners with a diverse range of social service professionals, including groups devoted to caring for homeless individuals and families, veterans, at-risk youth, and others in need. Together with these organizations and supporters, we work to identify and fill urgent needs, providing financial support, while fostering a spirit that empowers others to pay it forward.

The BullPen Story

Boston BullPen Project was established in early 2017 by four childhood friends: Steve Alperin, Alan Stern, Ben Levin, and Michael Connelly. Over their decades-long relationship, the four shared many things in common, chief among them, a love of baseball and a commitment to helping those in need.

As lifelong Bostonians, the four men have deep personal and professional ties in their communities. They've been fortunate to achieve success in their respective fields and feel they have a unique opportunity to provide help to their fellow community members who are in need.

Steve, Alan, Ben, and Mike called upon their varied experiences with other charitable causes in creating Boston BullPen Project and determining how they wanted their organization to operate.

Boston BullPen Project's Vision

To provide help to a wide and diverse community of Massachusetts residents, including veterans, families, at-risk youth, homeless, patients, and others

To partner with agencies and groups that are experienced with offering support to in-need residents, ensuring help is provided where it's needed most

To identify gaps in social services and respond quickly and effectively to critical needs that would otherwise go unfulfilled

To promote a spirit of "paying it forward." Recipients of Boston BullPen Project's help receive a gift card to share with a friend or family member in need

How BullPen Works

All requests for Boston BullPen Project's help originate from our partner organizations. The role of our social service partners is to serve as intermediary who identifies individuals in crisis. Our grants do not pass through the organizations but instead directly to the creditor whether it be a landlord, utility company, or grocery store.

The BullPen evaluates each request on the following criteria: that it is a one-time ask, and that the help provided will empower the recipient to move on from a difficult situation, to better themselves, to meet the essential living needs of them and/or their family, and to ensure that the problem is solved going forward. Most requests are approved and fulfilled in less than 48 hours.

The Power of Philanthropy and “Paying it Forward”

For those in need, a missed rent payment, a lapse in insurance coverage, or a lack of transportation can mean the difference between persistent struggle and a path to success.

Boston BullPen Project provides specific support at critical junctures for struggling families and individuals. We are committed to meeting these urgent needs, with the ultimate goal of improving the overall quality of life.

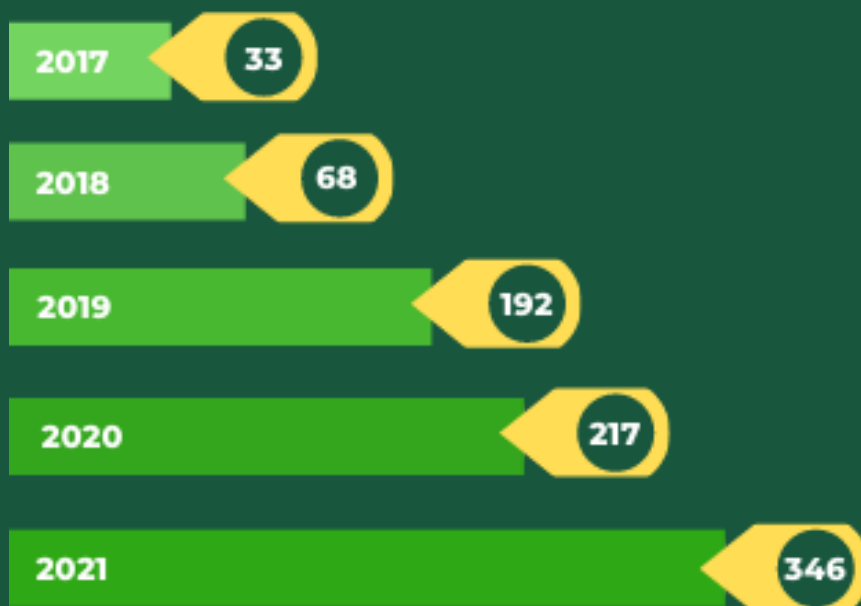

Since 2017, Boston BullPen Project has:

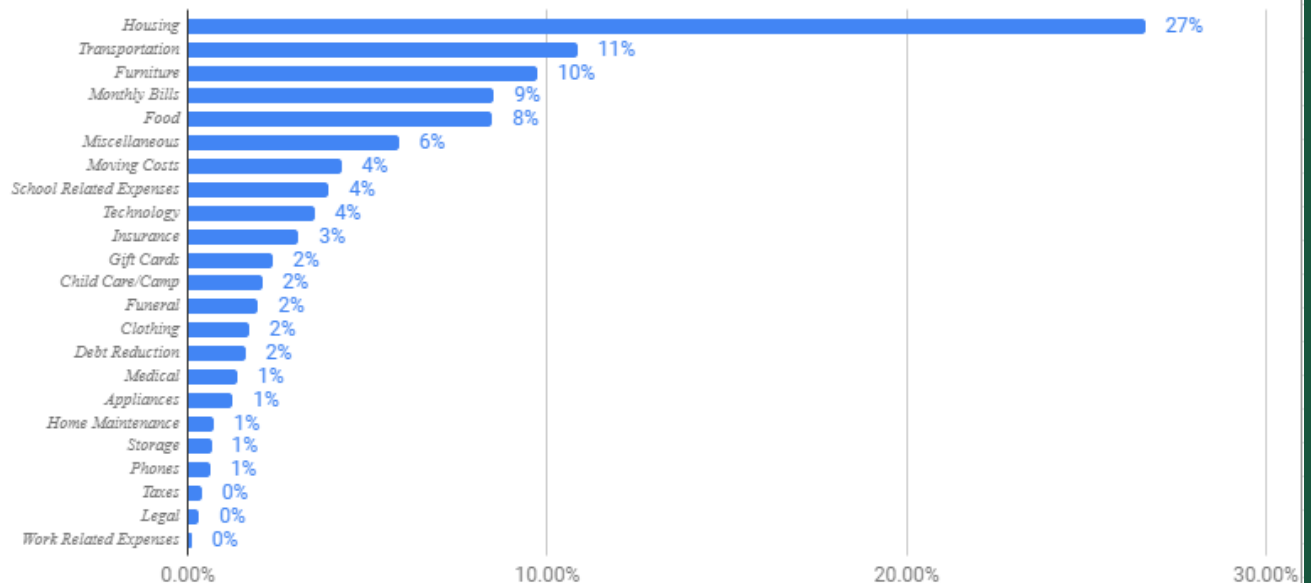
- Partnered with 60+ social service organizations
- To date, 97% of funds raised have been committed to help individuals in need.
- Approved and fulfilled more than 1,075 requests, which helped more than 2,661 people, most in less than 48 hours
- Provided more than \$701,095 in financial support thru May 23, 2022, with an average grant of \$652
